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THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE JUDICIARY AND THE RULERS IN TRADITIONAL ISLAM AND ITS APPLICATION IN PAKISTAN

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ABSTRACT

According to Kasani, it is [justice] one of the best acts of devotion !and ' one of the most important duties, arter belief in God [1]. The paper deals with one of the important departments of the government (the department of Qada). The author gives an account of the importance of the judiciary in traditional Islam and the author also analyses the role played by the early judges in Islam. Finally, the author makes some comparison between the early judges in Islam and the pakistani judges and concludes that despite their moral, constitional and religious commitments most of the judges in Pakistan failed to discharge their duties fearlessly and conscientiously.
